A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT Rodger Guerrero

It's a New Year, and hopefully it will be a joyous and successful one for all of us. I don't know about you, but for me there is always a sense of possibility, of hope, of potential when January comes around. I firmly believe that it is feasible to alter one's course in midstream. I firmly believe that with sufficient reflection, positive, meaningful change can occur. I firmly believe that you <u>can</u> teach an old dog new tricks. And after nearly thirty years in the choral field, I'm quite experienced (re: old).

As a choral educator, there are three important questions I ask of myself each January, prior to the resumption of school. Asking them is the easy part. Answering them honestly...well, that's a completely different and difficult process. Here they are, accompanied by their significance in the choral rehearsal:

I. Has the quality of the learning experience of each student I teach functioned separately from their collective achievement?

This is that old "Product" vs. "Process question. Of course, the quality of the concerts and festival performances is important to everyone – students included. However, *learning is not a linear process*. Similarly, rehearsals should not be exclusively intended to attain concert goals. Our singers have distinct worlds and experiential circles. Only they know how their circles function and are tangential to the choral educational world in which we interact with them. The information we present to them within our world may or may not transform what they know and have experienced. The only way to find out is to constantly ask them about it. If we spend entire rehearsals talking <u>at</u> our students, we will never receive accurate responses <u>from</u> them about what they have learned and how it relates to their circles of knowledge and experience.

II. Have the students I teach been able to forge their own meaning from the musical information and experiences I have shared with them?

As a choral educator, I know that students garner much less meaning from my lectures than they do from process-founded, problem-based, investigative, and experientially constructed activities. The choir exponentially improves as a whole when each individual singer latches onto consistent, conceptual musical understanding. I must therefore structure their learning as a series of opportunities. Telling them what to do isn't enough. Showing them what to do is marginally better. Asking them what they think should be done is incredibly effective. Refining or revising their suggestions by presenting contradictions, asking more questions, offering additional information, or encouraging them to research...well that's the way it should be done.

III. How can I apply this Constructivist Educational Approach to the choral rehearsal?

<u>I must always seek and value the students' point of view</u>. <u>They</u> must lead rehearsal discussions about sound, literature, textual meaning, musical expression, singer positioning, scheduling, social activities, the learning process, and more. I must listen to and apply <u>their</u> observations as equally-invested listeners. I must encourage <u>them</u> to creatively use technology during rehearsals as fact-finders. <u>They</u> must become enthusiastic about exploring and sharing rehearsal review via email and other online discussion outlets. The activities I design in every rehearsal must challenge the suppositions <u>they</u> bring from <u>their</u> experiential circles. Rehearsals are less meaningful when they are conductor-centered. I must therefore learn about and validate the students' previous experiences in order to gain <u>their</u> trust before I challenge them. I must pose problems of emerging relevance for <u>them</u>, and this means continual shifting. Concert repertoire must therefore be designed and altered for <u>their</u> benefit (something I must personally address for the next two weeks as I tackle their post-HW Winter Concert email reflections). Most importantly, I must continue to enthusiastically interact with the students when they return from Winter Break, each and every day.

So: what new tricks will you try this year? Let me know. I would love to learn from you!

Festival Participation: Resolutions for a New Year

Recently, I've been reflecting upon my early years as an educator and how much differently I approach my students now than I did all those years ago. Many things about my teaching have changed, hopefully for the better. However, as much as I have evolved as an educator and choral director, one thing never seems to change: FESTIVALS CAN BE SCARY!!!!!



Am I wrong? How many of us as directors fill out that paperwork every year with trepidation? Questioning whether or not our groups will be ready, if we will pick the right repertoire, if the judges will treat our students fairly, if our singers will even turn in the permission slip, etc. How many of us become simply too overwhelmed by these obstacles and decide not to attend any festival at all? Let's be honest, some years are just more difficult than others and it just doesn't make sense to attend a festival. But if we let too much time go by this becomes the norm, and we find it much more comfortable back in the choir 'womb.' Very much like our New Year's Resolution to start working out more regularly, it is very difficult to change behavior that we are used to. (Guilty as charged!)

But the fact of the matter is that festivals are just as good for us as they are for our students. They force us out of the "womb" and into the blinding light. Festivals give us a fresh set of expert ears, enabling us to take the next step with our ensembles. It is good for our students to see their teachers willing to take constructive criticism and put it to use in rehearsal. From our examples they become more willing to take musical risks with each other and with us as their directors. I would like to encourage those of you who have stayed away from festivals to take a leap of faith in this New Year. Resolve to be that courageous director once again and sign up for a festival! Choose the level that is right for you and your students, and go for it! Your students will thank you.

Will and Means Karen Garrett, VPI Honor Choir



"Nothing is impossible; there are ways that lead to everything, and if we had sufficient will we should always have sufficient means. It is often merely for an excuse that we say things are impossible."

In September, Jennifer Stanley, Executive Vice President for SCVA, published the results of a survey given to our membership regarding the possible addition of sight-reading in the SCVA Choral Festivals. The survey results indicated that a majority of our membership had the "will" to have sight-reading as an added component to some of our spring Choral Festivals. In an effort to be responsive to membership we have added five festivals with a sight-reading component in 2015.

It has never been more exciting to be a part of SCVA. After survey results indicated that though a majority of directors have the WILL to include sight-reading as an added component to some Festivals, many are looking for the MEANS. The **Festival Sight-Reading Level Rubric** (<u>www.scvachoral.org</u>/festivals/rubric of levels 1-6) tells us exactly what musicianship skills the choir will need to be successful at each level of Festival sight reading. Remember you choose the level – start at level one and sing unison this year. It's getting started that is important, not the level! There are a number of sight reading courses currently in print that will get your choirs on the way to the desired level.

- <u>The Jensen Sight Singing Course</u> by David Bauguess is very well sequenced and methodical. I love the suggested aural preparation prior to each level. Level 3 in the Festival Level Rubric will correspond approximately with Level 5 in the Jensen Vol. 1 book (with some extra rhythm prep needed). Vol 2 will introduce the chromaticism for level 6 of the Festival Level Rubric. Available at www.jwpepper.com - \$3.95 for student copy.
- 2) <u>The Masterworks Press "Let's Get Started & "Easy Rhythm Series"</u> is only \$40 for a set of reproducible masters. These sheets are in all choral voicings (Unison-4 part) and will prepare you well for harmony singing. MWP has a series for any level you might wish to prepare from beginning to advanced. Since MWP prepared the Festival Level Rubric and has composed sight reading examples for festivals for years, you can go to their website and purchase past festival sight-reading examples. www.masterworkspress.com.
- 3) <u>Sight –Singing for SSA by Joyce Eilers and Emily Crocker:</u> This booklet will take you all the way from level 1-6 on the Festival Level Rubric. From step-wise motion quarter notes to chromatics and sixteenth notes. Fast paced but accessible for your women's choir. Available at <u>www.jwpepper.com</u> \$3.50 student copy.
