Sight Reading Under Pressure

When I was a sophomore in High School I tested level 8 of Certificate of Merit through the Music Teachers' Association of California. At this point in my musical development, I had not fully grasped the concept of audiating, and really struggled with sight reading anything which included leaps of any kind. Halfway through my melodic sight reading, as I was engaged in a staring contest with a perfect fourth, my adjudicator interjected "You're really not prepared, are you?"

I was crushed. I had practiced for weeks, but no amount of *Here Comes the Bride* could get me to sing Do-Fa that day (stay tuned for related tonal function epiphanies in my next article). Since then I have always had a soft, proud spot in my heart for students who struggle with sight reading but continue to audition for honor choirs and similar events. What courage. I will always smile at them, and tell them to take a deep breath and keep trying.

Solfege-related trauma aside, as an adjudicator over the past ten years I have noticed some patterns among auditioning singers, and I'd love to see our membership pass along a few tips to their students for avoiding sightreading stress and putting their best foot forward in the audition room - for next year's Honor Choir, or any of their future musical endeavors:

- 1. When you get stuck during rehearsal, **DON'T START OVER**. Stop at the trouble spot, and walk from the pitch you know to the pitch you don't know. Use hand signs. Point at the lines and spaces. Do whatever you can. If you still can't hear it, find the next nearest DO and walk backwards. So many singers waste the rehearsal time re-singing the easy parts of the exercise (usually the first three measures) in a panic, and never make it past whatever leap or accidental was challenging them.
- 2. **Rehearse out loud.** Fight that embarrassed inner voice and just do it. I even love to hear a singer's inner monologue set free during rehearsal time with a "no, that's not it," or "Dang it, where is DO?!" When you rehearse out loud, your actual sight reading becomes the second attempt, not the first.
- 3. **Start SLOWLY.** Don't sing your first two notes any faster than you can sing the fastest portion of the example.
- 4. If all else fails and you can't hear the correct pitches, at least **sing the rhythms**. Salvage whatever points you can get by not giving up completely. Sometimes our brains just have lapses in audiating ability or forget solfege syllables try not to let that derail your work. Get back to DO at the end if you can, and just finish it.

Ultimately, reading music at sight should be such an empowering skill for us as singers. When we really get it, we are unstoppable! Let's give our students the tools they need so that, rather than just a painful moment to get through as quickly as possible, auditions become a true reflection of their growth and success in their music literacy journey.


LET'S SING

Nina Crecia teaches at Jeffrey Trail Middle School. She is currently in her 3rd year of teaching and her 1st at Jeffrey Trail.

Describe the structure of your program: (size, schedule, ensemble voicing):
I am currently hired on a 80% contract, and I teach chorus, drama, and two sections of musical theater (and I teach a home room and offer Advantage classes on Wednesdays). My choir currently has 22 students. We are performing in three parts, with a few changed and changing voices singing the tenor/bass part. My drama class has 24 students, and we are preparing for our spring play, a murder mystery! My musical theater classes have 34 and 39 students respectively, and we are preparing separate performances for both classes of the musical The Lion King Jr.

What about your program are you most proud of:

As the new teacher this year for our program, I am especially proud of the community I am building with my students. My goal as a teacher is to make every student feel like they belong, and I have been working hard on creating a space in which students feel safe to explore and express themselves creatively.

Favorite repertoire you have recently programed:

This year, Chorus sang two pieces that mean a lot to me: 'Vois sur ton chemin' from the movie Les Choristes, and 'The Road Not Taken' by Ruth Elaine Schram. We are currently working on 'Hold On' by Victor C. Johnson, which I have been excited to program as well! I was also a theater kid, so I love that I get to do musicals in my musical theater classes as well! In our Winter concert, we did medleys from Wicked, Into the Woods, Dear Evan Hansen, and In the Heights!

Tell us about your life outside the classroom:

In my personal life, I am very much a homebody! I love movie nights with the family, going for walks or hikes together, and having a cup of coffee while reading a good book. Once I am a bit more settled in my new position, I would love to go back to performing myself – either in a choir, or in musical theater shows!
